

AN ORDINANCE NO. 3-40—To accept the deed of the Columbus Metropolitan Housing Authority dated December 30, 1939, for a strip of land situated south of East Market street and extending westwardly from Champion avenue to said East Market street, as hereinafter described, to dedicate said strip of land to public use for street purpose, to name said street so dedicated, and to repeal ordinance No. 353-39, passed October 9, 1939.

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the deed of the Columbus Metropolitan Housing Authority dated December 30, 1939, for the following real estate situated in the county of Franklin, state of Ohio, and in the city of Columbus, and bounded and described as follows:

Being a strip of land hereinafter described, situated south of East Market street and extending westwardly from Champion avenue to said East Market street, and more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the west line of Champion avenue 58.37 feet south of the center line of East Market street as now dedicated, which is proposed to be vacated; thence southwardly along the west line of Champion avenue 20 feet to a point; thence westwardly on a line at right angles to Champion avenue 246.79 feet, more or less, to a point in the south line of East Market street; thence northeastwardly along the south line of East Market street 75.29 feet to a point; thence eastwardly on a line at right angles to Champion avenue and parallel to and 20 feet distant from the second described line 174.20 feet to the place of beginning.

be and the same is hereby accepted and the premises conveyed therein are hereby dedicated to public use for street purposes.

Sec. 2. That the strip of land described and dedicated in section 1 hereof be and the same is hereby named "East Market Street."

Sec. 3. That ordinance No. 353-39, passed October 9, 1939, be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 4-40—To authorize and direct the board of purchase to advertise for and open bids for chemical lime for use in the department of public service, division of sewage treatment, during the year ending December 31, 1940.

Whereas, an emergency exists in the usual daily operation of the department of public service, division of sewage treatment, in that chemical lime will be needed immediately in the usual daily operation of said division, and for the protection of public health, peace and safety; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the board of purchase be and it is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for and open bids for furnishing approximately 400 tons of chemical lime, in accordance with specifications on file in the office of the board of purchase, for use in the division of sewage treatment during the year ending December 31, 1940.

Sec. 2. That for the reasons stated in the preamble hereto, which is hereby made a part hereof, this ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval by the mayor.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 5-40—To authorize and direct the board of purchase to advertise for and open bids for fuel oil for use in the department of public service, division of sewage treatment, during the year ending December 31, 1940.

Whereas, an emergency exists in the usual daily operation of the department of public service, division of sewage treatment, in that fuel oil will be needed immediately in the usual daily operation of said division, and for the protection of public health, property, peace and safety; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the board of purchase be and it is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for and open bids for furnishing approximately 250,000 gallons of fuel oil, in accordance with specifications on file in the office of the board of purchase, for use in the division of sewage treatment during the year ending December 31, 1940.

Sec. 2. That for the reasons stated in the preamble hereto, which is hereby made a part hereof, this ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval by the mayor.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 6-40—To authorize and direct the board of purchase to advertise for and open bids for anhydrous ferric chloride for use in the department of public service, division of sewage treatment, during the year ending December 31, 1940.

Whereas, an emergency exists in the usual daily operation of the department of public service, division of sewage treatment, in that anhydrous ferric chloride will be needed immediately in the usual daily operation of said division, and for the protection of public health, peace and safety; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the board of purchase be and it is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for and open bids for furnishing approximately 200 tons of anhydrous ferric chloride, in accordance with specifications on file in the office of the board of purchase, for use in the division of sewage treatment during the year ending December 31, 1940.

Sec. 2. That for the reasons stated in the preamble hereto, which is hereby made a part hereof, this ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval by the mayor.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 7-40—To vacate an unnamed street in Holton park.

Whereas, the plat of Hillcrest park addition dedicated an unnamed street extending southeastwardly and northwardly from its intersection with Westwood drive at a point east of Eldon avenue to its intersection with said Westwood drive at a point west of Eureka avenue, and

Whereas, said street is in that portion of Hillcrest park addition now known and used as Holton park and the vacation of said street will not be detrimental to the interest of the general public; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the unnamed street, extending southeastwardly and northwardly through Holton park from its intersection with Westwood drive at a point east of Eldon avenue to its

intersection with said Westwood drive at a point west of Eureka avenue, be and the same is hereby vacated.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 9-40—To vacate certain parts of streets and an alley in Tuttle field, a city owned playground.

Whereas, certain parts of two streets and an alley in Tuttle field are no longer of use to the general public, and

Whereas, the city of Columbus is the owner of all the land abutting on said streets and alley, and

Whereas, the vacation of certain parts of said streets and an alley will not be detrimental to the interest of the general public; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the following designated parts of streets and an alley be and they are hereby vacated:

Northwood avenue from the west line of Turpie avenue to the west line of the first alley west of Neil avenue, as established south of Northwood avenue;

Turpie avenue from the south line of Northwood avenue to the north line of the first alley south of Northwood avenue;

The alley north of Northwood avenue from the west line of lot 120 of C. O. Hunter's Marvine addition produced northwardly, east to the west line of the first alley west of Neil avenue.

Sec. 2. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
