Whereas, petition, signed by the owners of all lots and lands abutting upon the alley west of Latta Avenue, from the first alley north of Oak Street to the second alley north of Oak Street, was duly presented to this Council, praying for and consenting to the vacation of said alley, between the points named, and

Whereas, Council, upon hearing, is satisfied that there is good cause for such vacation as prayed for in said petition, that it will not be detrimental to the general interests and ought to be made; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the Council of the City of Columbus:

Section 1. That the 20.00 foot alley west of Latta Avenue and east of Linwood Avenue, extending from the north line of the first alley north of Oak Street to the south line of the second alley north of Oak Street, a distance of 21.3 feet, more or less, be and the same is hereby vacated.
