Parcel 3. Being a strip of land 30 feet in width off the east side of the residual part of lot E of the penitentiary farm of W. A. Neil described as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the south line of Dublin avenue with the west line of an alley 20 feet in width extending through and along the east side of said lot E, said point of intersection being 20 feet measured westwardly from the northeast corner of said lot E; thence southwardly with the said west line of alley 462.79 feet to the north line of Spring street; thence westwardly with the said north line of Spring street 30.55 feet to a point, said point being 50.92 feet west of the southeast corner of said lot E; thence northwardly on a line parallel with the said west line of alley and 30 feet measured westwardly at right angles therefrom 457.08 feet to the said south line of Dublin avenue; thence eastwardly with the said south line of Dublin avenue 30.00 feet to the place of beginning, containing 0.3168 acres of land;

be and the same is hereby accepted, and the premises conveyed in parcel 2 and parcel 3 are hereby dedicated to public use for street purposes.

AN ORDINANCE No. 145-33—To vacate a portion of West Spring street extending from an angle in said street just west of the Chesapeake & Ohio railroad tracks (formerly Hocking Valley railroad) to the south line of Dublin avenue, as hereinafter described.

Whereas, on the 15th day of May, 1933, a petition by the owner of all the lands (except such as is owned by the city of Columbus) abutting on that portion of West Spring street extending northwesterly from an angle

in said street just west of the Chesapeake & Ohio railroad tracks to the south line of Dublin avenue, as hereinafter fully described, was duly presented to council praying and consenting that said portion of said street be vacated; and,

Whereas, council, upon hearing, is satisfied that there is good cause for such vacation as prayed for, that it will not be detrimental to the general interests, and ought to be made; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That that portion of West Spring street described as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the south line of Dublin avenue with the east line of Spring street; thence southwardly with the said east line of Spring street 93.50 feet to an angle in said line; thence southeastwardly with the east line of Spring street 468.53 feet, more or less, to a point 39.47 feet distant, measured northwesterly from the intersection of the said east line of Spring street with the north line of Spring street; thence westwardly on a line parallel to the said north line of Spring street extended, and at a distance of 20.00 feet measured northwardly at right angles therefrom, a distance of 64.08 feet to a point 34.82 feet measured northwardly from, and normal to the center line of Spring street road at its intersection with the west line of Spring street; thence northwardly on a line normal to the said center line of Spring street road 5.18 feet; thence westwardly on a line curved to the left with a radius of 3248.47 feet, a distance of 65.53 feet to the intersection of the west line of Spring street with the north line of Spring street road; thence northwestwardly with the said west line of Spring street 420.73 feet to an angle in said line; thence northwardly with the west line of Spring street 94.42 feet to the said south line of Dublin avenue; thence eastwardly with the said south line of Dublin avenue extended, a distance of 90.00 feet to the place of beginning;

be and the same is hereby vacated.

Sec. 2. Inasmuch as the portion of the street so vacated crosses the premises of the petitioner therefor and that of the city of Columbus at an angle and there might be some question as to the property line between said premises after said vacation by reason of the reversionary interests in said vacated portion of said street, and inasmuch as the petitioner, in her petition, consented and agreed, that said property line should be as hereinafter set forth, it is therefore understood by and between this council and said petitioner that the property line between said premises after the taking effect of said vacation shall be on a straight line extending from a point in the south line of Dublin avenue 10 feet east of the present east line of Spring street, 90 feet wide to a point in the north line of Spring street road as now opened and dedicated, said point being 219.42 feet, chord measure, west of the present west line of said Spring street so vacated, all of which is shown on a drawing on file in the department of public service of the city of Columbus, designated, "Plan for extension of Spring street from a point west of Hocking Valley railroad to Sandusky street," and number 1080 Dr. D, dated October, 1930.

Sec. 3. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

AN ORDINANCE No. 146-33—To authorize the board of purchase to advertise for bids and enter into contract or contracts for the purchase of coal for the various divisions of the departments of public safety and public service.

Whereas, an emergency exists in that the contracts for furnishing coal for the division of water, electricity, garbage disposal, of the department of

public service, and the division of workhouse, of the department of public safety, will expire June 30, 1933, and that coal will be immediately needed for the daily operation of the various divisions of the city government; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the board of purchase be and it is hereby authorized to advertise for bids and enter into contract or contracts for the purchase of approximately 20,000 tons of nut, pea and slack coal for the division of electricity; approximately 10,000 tons of nut, pea and slack coal for the division of water; approximately 250 tons of four-inch lump coal for the division of water; approximately 1800 tons of nut, pea, and slack coal for the division of garbage disposal, approximately 600 tons of one-inch or smaller high fusing ash pulverizer coal for the division of garbage disposal; and approximately 675 tons of two-inch lump coal for the division of workhouse, for use in the various divisions of the city government during the six months' period ending December 31, 1933.

Sec. 2. That the sum of \$9888, or so much thereof as may be necessary, and the same is hereby appropriated from the 010-B-2, division 90 fund; \$19,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, and the same is hereby appropriated from the 010-B-2, division 82 fund; \$2100, or so much thereof as may be necessary, and the same is hereby appropriated from the 010-B-2 division 70 fund; and \$980, or so much thereof as may be necessary, and the same is hereby appropriated from the 010-B-2, division 41 fund, to pay for the cost of same.

Sec. 3. That for the reason stated in the preamble hereto, this ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure, and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval by the mayor.

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the board of purchase be and it is hereby authorized to advertise for bids and enter into contract or contracts for the purchase of approximately 14,000 pounds of meat for use at the Municipal Zoo, during the six months' period, ending December 31, 1933.

Sec. 2. That the sum of \$1190, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be and the same is hereby appropriated from 010-B-5, division 79 fund, for the purchase of meat.

Sec. 3. That for the reason stated in the preamble hereto, this ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure, and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval by the mayor.
