

and use of said underground structures shall be subject to the further condition that the city of Columbus shall have the right at any time to construct over, under or through the space occupied by said underground structures, water line, sewers, conduits or other lines, or any underground construction which may be deemed necessary to be placed in such location and that no compensation shall be paid therefor; that said grantee, its successors and assigns, upon notice from the city of Columbus, shall forthwith remove underground structures, and shall restore all pavements and sidewalks affected by such removal to the original condition thereof without cost to said city, and shall yield to said city all rights to occupy the space used for said structure or structures whenever said city shall determine the same to be necessary; that said city reserves the right to enter at any time upon the premises of the grantee, its successors and assigns and into said underground structures for the purpose of inspecting the condition and maintenance of said structures and that the occupation of the space by said underground structures is hereby permitted merely as an accommodation to said grantee, and that no right, title or interest of the public is waived or abridged in any way thereby, and that said grantee shall pay the cost of publication of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law and upon the filing by said grantee with the clerk of this council its acceptance in writing of each and all the terms, provisions and requirements of this ordinance, provided, however, that if said grantee shall fail to file such written acceptance and shall fail to pay the costs of publication of this ordinance within thirty days after the passage thereof, then the same shall be void and of no force and effect.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 180-39—To authorize the board of purchase to advertise for bids and enter into contract for the purchase of one line truck complete with appurtenant equipment for the division of electricity and trade in as part of the purchase price one unserviceable 1924 Graham-Bernstein two and one-half ton truck, engine No. 1583-K-4-8671, and to appropriate the money therefor.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 181-39—To authorize the board of purchase to advertise for bids and enter into contract for the purchase of one 1200 ampere exciter unit for the division of electricity and to appropriate the money therefor.

Whereas, it is necessary to provide additional exciter capacity for the power plant generators, and

Whereas, an emergency exists in the usual daily operation of the department of public service, division of electricity, in that it is necessary to provide additional exciter capacity for the immediate preservation of public health, peace, safety and property; now therefore

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the board of purchase be and it is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for bids and enter into contract for the purchase of one 1200 ampere exciter unit for the division of electricity.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 182-39—To authorize the director of public service to enter into contract with the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing company for inspecting and making the necessary repairs to the 6000 KW Westinghouse turbo-generator of the division of electricity and appropriate money therefor.

Whereas, said turbo-generator is in need of certain repairs and while same is dismantled should be thoroughly inspected and all necessary repairs made to restore same to a satisfactory operating condition, and

Whereas, the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing company being the manufacturer of said turbo-generator, is the only company thoroughly equipped to do this work, and

Whereas, an emergency exists in the usual daily operation of the department of public service, division of electricity, in that it is necessary to make the necessary inspection and repairs during the summer season for the immediate preservation of public health, peace, property and safety; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the director of public service be and he is hereby authorized and directed to enter into contract with the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing company, without advertising for bids, for service engineers, for the necessary inspection and repairs to the 6000 KW Westinghouse turbo-generator of the division of electricity to restore same to a satisfactory operating condition at a cost for service engineers of \$2.50 per hour, per eight hour day, subject to one and one-half times the regular hourly rate for overtime, Saturdays, Sundays and legal holidays, plus 6% for public liability, compensation insurance, and social security, plus reasonable travelling and living expenses, plus the necessary material and incidental expenses, to be charged for at the regular established prices of the Westinghouse company for such items.

Sec. 2. That the sum of \$4,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be and the same is hereby appropriated from division of electricity No. 82-300 fund, to pay the cost of same.

Sec. 3. That the city auditor be and he is hereby authorized and directed

to draw his warrant upon the city treasurer in favor of the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company, and said treasurer is authorized and directed to pay the amount of the cost of said work, upon receipt of voucher approved by the director of public service.

Sec. 4. That for the reasons stated in the preamble hereto, which is hereby made a part hereof, this ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval by the mayor.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 184-39—To vacate River street from the east line of Hayden avenue to the east line of the alley west of Chicago avenue, also certain portions, hereinafter described, of the alley west of Princeton avenue, Princeton avenue and the alley west of Chicago avenue.

Whereas, a petition, signed by the owner of all lots and lands abutting upon River street from the east line of Hayden avenue to the east line of the alley west of Chicago avenue, also certain portions, hereinafter described, of the alley west of Princeton avenue, Princeton avenue and the alley west of Chicago avenue, was duly presented to this council May 29, 1939, praying and consenting that said streets and alleys, between the points named, be vacated, and

Whereas, council, upon hearing, is satisfied that there is good cause for such vacation as prayed for in said petition, that it will not be detrimental to the general interests and ought to be made; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That River street from the east line of Hayden avenue to the east line of the alley west of Chicago avenue; also that portion of the alley west of Princeton avenue lying between the north line of River street and the south line of a proposed alley the length of said portion being 14.28 feet on its east line and 14.77 feet on its west line; also that portion of Princeton avenue lying between the north line of River street and the south line of said proposed alley, the length of said portion being 16.94 feet on its east line and 18.57 feet on its west line; also that portion of the alley west of Chicago avenue lying between the north line of River street and the south line of said proposed alley, the length of said portion being 11.74 feet on its east line and 12.23 feet on its west line, be and the same are hereby vacated.

Sec. 2. That the city of Columbus reserves the right to operate and maintain any and all sewers, water lines and other public utilities owned by said city and that the right is reserved to operate and maintain any and all other public utilities, if any, now existing on or in said streets and alleys to be vacated, and shall have the right to enter thereon for the purpose of operating, replacing and maintaining the same.

Sec. 3. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law, upon the payment by the petitioner herein of the cost of publication of this ordinance.
