NOTICE OF PETITION TO VACATE ALLEY

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a petition has been presented to the Council of the City of Columbus, praying for the vacation of the fifteen (15) foot alley south of lots numbers thirteen (13), fourteen (14), fifteen (15) and sixteen (16) of Wicklow addition to the city of Columbus; also for the vacation of the northern portion of the ten foot alley east of lots numbers seven (7), eight (8) and eighteen (18) of said Wicklow addition, beginning at the north line of lot number seventeen (17) extended, thence north to a line drawn parallel with and fifteen (15) feet north of the south line of lot number eighteen (18) extended.

Said petition is now pending before said Council, and will come up for final action on and after the 28th day of April, 1902.

ORDINANCE, No. 19,588, To provide for the improvement of Cleveland avenue from Buckingham street to Stanton street.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the city of Columbus, Ohio, That Cleveland avenue, from Buckingham street to Stanton street, shall be improved by grading and paving the same with asphalt, granite or other stone block, hard-burned bricks or blocks, or other substantial material, setting five-inch curb and constructing the necessary subdrains and catchbasins.

Section 2. Bonds of the city shall be issued by the Council from time to time as said improvement progresses, in order to provide for payment of the cost and expense of the same, in all, to an amount not exceeding the contract price of the work and other expenses attending the same and interest. The said bonds shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on the first days of March and September, and shall extend over a period of ten years. The bonds shall be of such denominations as the Council shall direct by ordinance, and shall be made redeemable at any time after four years from the date such bonds commence to run.

Section 3. When the whole work is done the amount of the bonds sold to pay for the same and the interest thereon until the next interest day, when assessments can be collected as hereinafter provided to pay the same, shall be taken as the cost of said improvement to be paid by the abutting property owners, and such amounts shall be assessed equally by the front foot of property fronting or abutting on said improvement.

The assessments for said improvement to be payable in semi-annual installments to meet the bonds provided for in this ordinance, as provided by an act of the General Assembly, passed March 14, 1893, as amended April 27, 1896, entitled, "An act to provide for the improvement of streets, avenues and alleys in cities of the first grade of the second class."

Sec. 4. Charles H. Neil and Moses H. Neil, owners of property abutting on said improvement, with the chief engineer, shall constitute a board, to act without compensation, who shall have the power and authority granted to such boards by the act of the General Assembly passed March 14, 1893, as amended April 27, 1896.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication according to law.

AN ORDINANCE, No. 19,498, To vacate Percy street from Perry street to the Olentangy river; also the alley (unnamed) between Percy street and Second avenue, from Perry street to the Olentangy river.

Whereas, A petition has been presented to the Council of the city of Columbus, Ohio, praying for the vacation of Percy street from Perry street to the Olentangy river; also, the alley (unnamed) between Percy street and Second avenue, from Perry street to the Olentangy river; and

Whereas, Notice of the pendency and prayer of said petition has been given by publishing the same in the Ohio State Journal, a newspaper of general circulation, as required by law; and

Whereas, The Council is satisfied that such vacation should be made; that the same will not be detrimental to the general interest; therefore,

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Council of the city of Columbus, Ohio, That Percy street from Perry street to the Olentangy river; also, the alley (unnamed) between Percy street and Second avenue, from Perry street to the Olentangy river, be and the same are hereby vacated, subject, however, to the rights of the city of Columbus or any of its duly authorized agents, to forever use the existing sewers therein, or to enter upon said property so vacated at any time for the purpose of cleaning, repairing or reconstructing any existing sewer therein or part thereof.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication according to law.

AN ORDINANCE, No. 19,379, Granting to the Central Ohio Realty and Investment Company and Florence Cockell the right to construct a covered arcaway on the south side of Gay street and east side of Lazelle street, under the sidewalk abutting the west end of inlet number 639 in the city of Columbus, Ohio.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Columbus, Ohio, as follows, to-wit:

Section 1. That the Central Ohio Realty and Investment Company and Florence Cockell, the owners of the west end of inlet No. 639, fronting 30 feet and 3 inches on

Gay street and 62 feet and 6 inches on Lazelle street be, and they are hereby granted the right to construct and maintain a covered arcaway under the sidewalk abutting said premises, under the direction of the city engineer and subject to the approval of the city building inspector of Columbus, Ohio.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect

1. From and after the conditions of Ordinance No. 19,089 of the city of Columbus have been fully complied with.

2. Upon its passage according to law.

AN ORDINANCE, No. 19,805, To confirm the assessment of the cost and expense of constructing a 15-inch and 8-inch pipe sewer in Gill alley and alley east of Kerr street.

Be it ordained by the Council of the city of Columbus, Ohio, as follows, to-wit:

Section 1. That the estimated assessment of the cost and expense of constructing a 15-inch and 8-inch pipe sewer in Gill alley and alley east of Kerr street, made by commissioners appointed by said council, and reported by said commissioners to said council and filed on the 6th day of January, 1902, which estimated assessment is now on file in the office of the city clerk, be and the same is hereby in all respects confirmed.

Sec. 2. That the owners of the several lots and parcels of land assessed as aforesaid shall pay the amounts of money by them severally due in that behalf to the director of accounts within twenty days from the first publication of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication according to law.
