Regular Meeting, Monday, June 4, 1934  
(No. 24)

Council met in regular session with President Karns in the chair. Roll call showed all members present.

Mrs. E. D. Carroll submitted a communication, complaining with regards to condition of alley running parallel with her home at 12 East North Broadway. Service.

The South Side Civic and Industrial association submitted a resolution adopted by that body, favoring adequate tests to determine the efficiency of various systems of treatment. Service.

James F. Henderson submitted a communication, stating he was representing several persons protesting building of an incinerator north of Seventeenth avenue. Service.

Carroll McGhee submitted a communication, expressing, in behalf of the educational committee of the Columbus Federation of Labor, appreciation

### ORDINANCES

AN ORDINANCE No. 211-34—To name the alley east of Washington avenue from Broad street to Avon court.

Whereas, it is the sense of this coun-

cil that the alley east of Washington avenue from Broad street to Avon court should be named; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the alley east of Washington avenue from Broad street to Avon court be and it is hereby named Zimmerman court.

Sec. 2. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

AN ORDINANCE No. 212-34—To prohibit parking on both sides of Ide terrace, between Town street and Rich street.

Whereas, an emergency exists in that the practice of parking automobiles and other vehicles on both sides of Ide terrace between Town street and Rich street, creates a hazardous condition; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the parking of automobiles and other vehicles be and it is hereby prohibited on both sides of Ide terrace between Town street and Rich street.

Sec. 2. That for the reason stated in the preamble hereto, this ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval by the mayor.

AN ORDINANCE No. 214-34—To authorize the director of public service to advertise for bids and to enter into contracts for the construction of the east wing addition to the city hall and to appropriate funds therefor.

Whereas, an emergency exists in the usual daily operation in the department of public service, in that it is immediately necessary to contract for the construction of the east wing addition to the city hall, Columbus, Ohio, in order that the same may be done in conformity with the National Industrial Recovery Act, public works administration, and for the immediate preservation of the public health, peace and safety; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the director of public service be and he is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for bids and to enter into contracts for the construction of the east wing addition to the city hall, Columbus, Ohio, in accordance with plans and specifications on file in the department of public service, all of which are hereby approved.

Sec. 2. That the sum of \$395,000 or so much thereof as may be needed be and the same is hereby appropriated, from east wing of the city hall building fund No. 1.

Sec. 3. That for the reason stated in the preamble hereto, this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval by the mayor.
