ANCE, No. 22441, To provide issue of bonds in anticipation of collection of special assessments to pay the cost and expense of widening Madison avenue, from Hoffman to Ohio avenue in the city of Columbus, Ohio.

ained, by the Council of the city of Columbus, state of Ohio:

1. That for the purpose of raising money in anticipation of the collection of special assessments to pay the cost and expense of improving Madison avenue, from Hoffman avenue to Ohio avenue, by repaving the roadway with asphalt laid upon concrete foundation, setting five-inch curbs, and constructing necessary subdrains and catch basins, upon the existing grade, in the city of Columbus, Ohio, in pursuance of ordinance No. 22359, determined July 3, 1905, bonds of the city of Columbus shall be issued to the amount of five thousand (\$5000.00) dollars.

Said bonds shall be issued in the name of the City of Columbus, Ohio, in pursuance of an act of the General Assembly of the state of Ohio, entitled "An act to provide for the organization of cities and incorporated villages," etc., passed October 22, 1902, and the amendments thereof; they shall not later than December 31, 1905, and payable on the first day of September, 1906; they shall be of the denomination of \$1000.00 each and numbered consecutively from one (1) to four (4), both inclusive.

Said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of four per cent per annum, and all interest accruing on said bonds shall mature and be due and payable on the first days of March and September of each year, and for which the proper interest coupons shall be attached and made part of said bonds. Both principal and interest shall be payable at the office of the Treasurer of the city of Columbus, Ohio.

Each bond shall be signed by the mayor and the auditor of the city of Columbus, Ohio, officially in their own handwriting and have affixed thereto the corporate seal of said city. Each coupon shall have printed thereon a fac-simile of the signature of the auditor, and the faith, credit and property of the city of Columbus, Ohio, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of said bonds and interest thereon at maturity.

The committee on finance of this Council is hereby authorized and directed to have said bonds and coupons properly prepared and executed in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, to record them in the office of the City Auditor and in the office of the trustees of the sinking fund, and to negotiate and sell the same in the manner prescribed by law.

Sec. 6. The proceeds of the sale of said bonds shall be paid into the City Treasury by said committee on finance and set aside in a fund to be designated as the Hildreth Ave., Bolivar to Twentieth, fund; all premiums and accrued interest received from the sale of said bonds shall be transferred, on warrant of the city auditor, to the trustees of the sinking fund of said city, to be by them applied in the manner prescribed by law.

Sec. 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

ANCE, No. 22437, To provide issue of bonds in anticipation of the collection of special assessments to pay the cost and expense of widening Hildreth avenue, from Bolivar street to Twentieth street, in the city of Columbus, Ohio.

ained, by the Council of the city of Columbus, state of Ohio:
1. That for the purpose of raising money in anticipation of the collection of special assessments to pay the cost and expense of improving Hildreth avenue, from Bolivar street to Twentieth street, by grading and paving roadway thereof with asphalt, laid brick or block, macadam

or other substantial material, setting five-inch curbs and constructing the necessary subdrains and catch basins, in the city of Columbus, Ohio, in pursuance of ordinance No. 22378, determined to proceed with said improvement, passed July 24, 1905, bonds of the city of Columbus shall be issued to the amount of four thousand dollars.

Sec. 2. Said bonds shall be issued under authority of an act of the General Assembly of the State of Ohio, entitled "An act to provide for the organization of cities and incorporated villages," etc., passed October 22, 1902, and the amendments thereof; they shall bear date not later than December 31, 1905; be due and payable on the first day of September, 1916, but subject to call or redemption at the option of the city of Columbus on or after the first day of September, 1906; they shall be of the denomination of \$1000.00 each and numbered consecutively from one (1) to four (4), both inclusive.

Sec. 3. Said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of four per cent per annum, and all interest accruing on said bonds shall mature and be due and payable on the first days of March and September of each year, and for which the proper interest coupons shall be attached and made part of said bonds. Both principal and interest shall be payable at the office of the Treasurer of the city of Columbus, Ohio.

Sec. 4. Each bond shall be signed by the mayor and the auditor of the city of Columbus, Ohio, officially in their own handwriting and have affixed thereto the corporate seal of said city. Each coupon shall have printed thereon a fac-simile of the signature of the auditor, and the faith, credit and property of the city of Columbus, Ohio, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of said bonds and interest thereon at maturity.

Sec. 5. The committee on finance of this Council is hereby authorized and directed to have said bonds and coupons properly prepared and executed in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, to record them in the office of the City Auditor and in the office of the trustees of the sinking fund, and to negotiate and sell the same in the manner prescribed by law.

Sec. 6. The proceeds of the sale of said bonds shall be paid into the City Treasury by said committee on finance and set aside in a fund to be designated as the Hildreth Ave., Bolivar to Twentieth, fund; all premiums and accrued interest received from the sale of said bonds shall be transferred, on warrant of the city auditor, to the trustees of the sinking fund of said city, to be by them applied in the manner prescribed by law.

Sec. 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

AN ORDINANCE, No. 22432, Determining to proceed with the construction of a certain sanitary sewer therein mentioned, in the city of Columbus, Ohio.

Be it ordained, by the Council of the city of Columbus, state of Ohio:

Section 1. That it is hereby determined to proceed with the construction of a sanitary sewer, beginning at the intersection of the first alley west of Third street and Markison avenue; thence southerly in said alley to Welch avenue; thence easterly in Welch avenue to Third street; also westerly in Welch avenue to the first alley east of High street; thence southerly in the first alley east of High street to Morrill avenue; also in Welch avenue from Fourth street to Third street; also in the first alley west of Fourth street from Welch avenue to Morrill avenue; also in the first alley west of Fourth street from Markison avenue to the alley south of Markison avenue, in the city of Columbus, Ohio, in accordance with the resolution declaring it necessary to improve said thoroughfare adopted by Council June 26, 1905; and in accordance with the plans, specifications and estimate of cost therefor heretofore approved and now on file in the office of the department of public service.

Sec. 2. That all claims for damages

resulting therefrom shall be judicially inquired into before commencement of the proposed improvement, and the city solicitor be and he is hereby authorized and directed to institute proceedings in a court of competent jurisdiction to inquire into such claims.

Sec. 3. That the whole cost of said improvement, together with interest on bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of the assessments to be levied for said improvement and all other necessary expenditures, less one-fiftieth thereof and the cost of intersections, shall be assessed in proportion to the special benefits which may result from the improvement upon the following described lots and lands, to-wit: All lots and lands fronting, bounding or abutting upon the proposed improvement, which said lots and lands are hereby determined to be specially benefited by said improvement in the amount of the cost thereof.

Sec. 4. That the sum of \$600.00 be and the same is hereby appropriated from the street improvement and intersection fund, to pay the remainder of the cost of said improvement.

Sec. 5. That the assessments so to be levied shall be due and payable in thirty (30) days from and after the date of the assessing ordinance to the City Treasurer; if not so paid, shall be certified to the County Auditor, to be by him placed on the tax duplicate and collected in the manner provided by law.

Sec. 6. That bonds of the city of Columbus, Ohio, shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of the assessments by installments, and in an amount equal thereto.

Sec. 7. That the Board of Public Service be and is hereby authorized and directed to make and execute contract for said improvement with the lowest and best bidder after advertising according to law.

Sec. 8. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

AN ORDINANCE, No. 22425, To vacate that portion of North street extending west of the west line of Neil avenue; also a certain 17-foot alley extending southwardly from said North street, along the west ends of lots Nos. 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15, of Walsh & Stone's subdivision of outlots Nos. 26 and 27, in the city of Columbus, Ohio; also a certain alley 47.54 feet wide, extending westwardly from said 17-foot alley, along the north ends of lots Nos. 7, 8 and 9, of said Walsh & Stone's subdivision; also a certain 20-foot alley extending southwardly from said 47.54-foot alley, along the west side of said lot No. 9 to Doddridge street; all in the city of Columbus, Ohio.

Whereas, a petition has been presented to the City Council of the city of Columbus, Ohio, praying for the vacation of that portion of North street extending west of the west line of Neil avenue; also a certain 17-foot alley, extending southwardly from said North street, along the west ends of lots Nos. 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15, of Walsh & Stone's subdivision of outlots Nos. 26 and 27, in said city of Columbus; also a certain alley 47.54 feet wide, extending westwardly from said 17-foot alley along the north ends of lots Nos. 7, 8 and 9 of said Walsh & Stone's subdivision; also a certain 20-foot alley, extending southwardly from said 47.54-foot alley along the west side of said lot No. 9 to Doddridge street; all in said city of Columbus, Ohio; and,

Whereas, notice of the pendency and prayer of said petition has been published as required by law; and,

Whereas, the said Council is satisfied that said vacation should be made, and that the same will not be detrimental to the general public interest; therefore,

Section 1. Be it ordained, by the City Council of the city of Columbus, state of Ohio:

That that portion of North street extending west of the west line of Neil avenue; also a certain 17-foot alley extending southwardly from said North street, along the west ends of lots Nos. 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15 of Walsh & Stone's subdivision of outlots Nos. 26 and 27, in the town of North

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Columbus, now the city of Columbus; also a certain alley 47.54 feet wide, extending westwardly from said 17-foot alley, along the north ends of lots Nos. 7, 8 and 9 of said Walsh & Stone's subdivision; also a certain 20-foot alley, extending southwardly from said 47.54-foot alley, along the west side of said lot No. 9 to Doddridge street; all in said city of Columbus, Ohio; be, and the same are hereby vacated.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication according to law.

AN ORDINANCE, No. 22434, To make appropriation from "The Public Library Equipment and Furnishing Fund," for the purpose of purchasing book stacks, furniture, electric and gas fixtures for the Columbus Public Library building of the city of Columbus, Ohio, for improving the grounds around said building and for otherwise fitting said building for public use.

Be it ordained, by the Council of the city of Columbus, state of Ohio:

Section 1. That from the moneys now in the fund known as the "Public Library Equipment and Furnishing Fund," there be and there is hereby appropriated to the use of the trustees of the Columbus Public Library, for the purchase of book stacks, furniture and electric and gas fixtures for the Columbus Public Library building of the city of Columbus, Ohio, for improving the grounds around said building and for otherwise fitting said building for public use, the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00).

Sec. 2. That the amount appropriated in the foregoing section 1 shall be paid upon the order of the trustees of the Public Library, in accordance with law.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and the earliest period allowed by law.

RESOLVED, by the Council of the city of Columbus, state of Ohio:

(a) That it is necessary to improve Walnut street, from High street to Market street, by grading and paving the roadway thereof with asphalt, hard-burned brick or block, or other substantial material, setting five-inch curb and constructing the necessary subdrains and catch basins, in the city of Columbus, Ohio, in accordance with the plans, specifications, estimates and profiles of the proposed improvement prepared by the Chief Engineer, which are hereby approved;

(b) That the grade of said street as improved shall be as shown on the plans, to-wit:

North curb—Beginning at the intersection of the north curb line of Walnut street with the east lot line of

High street, at elevation 83.60 ft. city datum; thence on a 2.24 per cent descending grade for a distance of 188 ft. to the west lot line of Pearl street, at elevation 79.38 ft.; thence for a distance of 35 ft. to the east lot line of Pearl street at elevation 78.96 ft.; thence on a 1.12 per cent descending grade for a distance of 158 feet to a point at elevation 77.13 ft.; thence on a .42 per cent descending grade for a distance of 283.5 ft. to the west lot line of Third street, at elevation 75.92 ft.; thence for a distance of 82.5 feet to the east lot line of Third street at elevation 75.85 ft.; thence on a .35 per cent ascending grade for a distance of 90 ft. to a point at elevation 76.23 ft.; thence on a .66 per cent descending grade for a distance of 99.5 ft. to the west lot line of Lazelle street at elevation 75.58 ft.; thence for a distance of 33 ft. to the east lot line of Lazelle street at elevation 75.53 ft.; thence on a .61 per cent ascending grade for a distance of 110.5 ft. to the west lot line of Market street at elevation 76.26 ft.

South curb—Beginning at the intersection of the south curb line of Walnut street with the east lot line of High street, at elevation 83.70 ft.; thence on a 2:17 per cent descending grade for a distance of 188 ft. to the west lot line of Pearl street, at elevation 79.62 ft.; thence for a distance of 35 ft. to the east lot line of Pearl street at elevation 78.96 ft.; thence on a 1.12 per cent descending grade for a distance of 158 feet to a point, at elevation 77.13 ft.; thence on a .43 per cent descending grade for a distance of 283.5 ft. to the west lot line of Third street, at elevation 75.89 ft.; thence for a distance of 82.5 ft. to the east lot line of Third street at elevation 75.81 ft.; thence on a .42 per cent ascending grade for a distance of 90 ft. to a point, at elevation 76.01 ft.; thence on a .66 per cent descending grade for a distance of 99.5 ft. to the west lot line of Lazelle St. at elevation 75.46 ft.; thence for a distance of 33 ft. to the east lot line of Lazelle St. at elevation 75.64 ft.; thence on a .56 per cent ascending grade for a distance of 110.5 ft. to the west lot line of Market St. at elevation 76.26 ft.

(c) That the whole cost of said improvement, less one-fiftieth thereof and the cost of intersections, shall be assessed in proportion to the special benefits which may result from the improvement upon the following described lots and lands, to-wit: All lots and lands bounding and abutting upon the proposed improvement, which said lots and lands are hereby determined to be specially benefited by said improvement, and in an amount equal to the cost thereof;

(d) That the assessments so to be levied shall be paid in ten annual installments, with interest on deferred payments, at a rate not exceeding six per cent per annum; provided that the owner of any property assessed may, at his option, pay such assessment or any number of installments of the same, at any time after such assessment has been levied, with interest to the semi-annual interest day of said bonds next following the date of payment;

(e) That bonds of the city of Columbus, Ohio, shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of the assessments by installments, and in an amount equal thereto;

(f) That the remainder of the entire cost of said improvement shall be paid by the issuance of bonds in the manner provided by law.

RESOLVED, by the Council of the city of Columbus, state of Ohio:

(d) That the assessments so to be levied shall be paid in ten annual installments, with interest on deferred payments at a rate not exceeding six per cent per annum; provided that the owner of any property assessed may, at his option, pay such assessment or any number of installments of the same at any time after such assessment has been levied, with interest to the semi-annual interest day of said bonds next following the date of payment;

(e) That bonds of the city of Columbus, Ohio, shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of the assessments by installments, and in an amount equal thereto;

(f) That the remainder of the entire cost of said improvement shall be paid by the issuance of bonds in the manner provided by law.
