

order of the director of public service; that the amounts appropriated by section 5 shall be paid by transfer to the trustees of the sinking fund; and that no order shall be drawn or money paid except upon vouchers, the form of which shall be approved by the city auditor.

Sec. 7. Except in the matter of payrolls providing for the payment of the salaries of officers and employees regularly employed by the city, and extraordinary emergencies, no warrant shall be issued in liquidation of vouchers, unless the department contracting the expense shall have first obtained an order duly certified that there are sufficient funds appropriated to the credit of the proper fund from which the expenditure is to be made, which certificate must be obtained prior to the incurrence of the obligation; and the head of any department or division authorized to contract expenditures will be held personally responsible for any obligation incurred contrary to the provisions of this section.

Sec. 8. That it is understood that this council is not making specific appropriations for each item of every classification hereinbefore contained, but only for the total for each department and sub-department as shown in the final column. The itemized classification shall, however, constitute limitations on the powers of the several department heads as granted in section 6, and no such officer

shall make any expenditures for any other purpose or in an amount beyond that of the particular classification, without the approval of the mayor, city auditor, and head of the department.

Sec. 9. That, effective January 1, 1933, a reduction of ten per cent in funds allocated as salaries to all divisions and departments of the city government, with the exception of the departments of health and public library, to be paid on regular payrolls, is hereby made from the 1933 budget, in accordance with a resolution of this council adopted February 6, 1933, relative thereto.

Sec. 10. That no appropriation made by this ordinance shall be used for the purchase or exchange of any automobile or motorcycle, and no automobile or motorcycle belonging to the city of Columbus shall be sold without the express approval of the city council.

Sec. 11. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law. Passed February 6, 1933.

AN ORDINANCE No. 23-33—To prohibit the parking of vehicles on the west side of Wall street from the first alley north of Gay street to Elm street.

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the parking of vehicles on the west side of Wall street from the first alley north of Gay street to Elm street be and the same is hereby prohibited both day and night.

Sec. 2. For the violation of this ordinance, the penalty as fixed in the traffic code of Columbus shall apply and be in force.

Sec. 3. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

AN ORDINANCE No. 31-33—To vacate Dublin avenue from the east bank of the Olentangy river to a point approximately 75 feet east thereof.

Whereas, that portion of Dublin avenue extending from the west bank of the Olentangy river to the east bank of said river has been vacated on account of the proposed removal of the Dublin avenue bridge, by ordinance No. 513-32, passed November 21, 1932, and

Whereas, council is satisfied that such proposed vacation should be made, that the same will not be detrimental to the general interest and that it is no longer of use to the public; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the following described portion of Dublin avenue be, and it is hereby vacated: beginning at the intersection of the center line of Dublin avenue with the east bank of the Olentangy river; thence eastwardly with the said center line of Dublin avenue a distance of 75 feet, more or less to a point which is 30 feet southwardly, measured at right angles with said center line, from an iron pipe in the north line of said Dublin avenue, said iron pipe marking the southwest corner of a certain portion of lot "F" of W. A. Neil's penitentiary farm subdivision acquired by the city of Columbus from E. A. Cole and the Columbus Trunk company, by deed recorded September 2, 1925 in deed book 811, page 606, Franklin county recorder's office.

Sec. 2. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

AN ORDINANCE No. 34-33—To regulate the operation of school buses and vehicles on the streets and highways of Columbus.

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. The term "vehicle" as used in this ordinance shall be construed to have the same meaning as is given such term in section 6290 of the general code of Ohio.

The term "school bus," when used in this ordinance, shall mean any vehicle being used to convey children to and from school and which is marked in both front and rear with the words, "school bus," in plain lettering, readable in daylight at a distance of at least two hundred feet from such vehicle.

Sec. 2. The driver of a vehicle when approaching the front or rear of a school bus that has come to a stop on a street or road, while in the act of receiving or discharging school children, shall stop such vehicle not less than ten feet from such school bus and keep said vehicle stationary until such children have entered said bus or have alighted and reached the nearest adjacent side of such street or road.

Section 3. The driver of a school bus shall load and discharge the passengers of such bus at the extreme right side of the paved or improved portion of the street or road, and at the right curbing when such curbing is maintained on such street or road.

Sec. 4. Whoever, being the driver of a vehicle or school bus fails to carry out the provisions of this ordinance, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than ten nor more than one hundred dollars or be imprisoned in the city workhouse not to exceed thirty days or both.

Sec. 5. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

AN ORDINANCE No. 35-33—To provide for the flushing with water, sweeping and cleaning of streets, avenues, alleys, sidewalks and public ways of the city of Columbus situated in the district bounded on the east by Parsons avenue, on the south by Whittier street, on the west by Sandusky street, and on the north by Fifth avenue, and also that area of each of High street, Broad street, Whittier street, Cleveland avenue, Livingston avenue, Mt. Vernon avenue, Long street, Parsons avenue, Town street and Main street which is situated outside of district above described and within the corporate limits of the city of Columbus, and authorizing and directing the di-

rector of public service to do said cleaning during the year 1933.

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That it is hereby declared necessary to flush with water, sweep and clean during the year 1933 the aforementioned streets, avenues, alleys, sidewalks and public ways of the city of Columbus, Ohio.

Sec. 2. That the director of public service is hereby authorized and directed to flush with water, sweep and clean the aforementioned streets, avenues, alleys, sidewalks and public ways, as provided in the schedule thereof, heretofore approved by said director, and now on file in the department of public service.

Sec. 3. That the cost of said work upon each of said streets, avenues, alleys, sidewalks and public ways, or parts thereof, shall be assessed upon the lots and lands bounding and abutting upon each of said highways by the foot frontage, which said lots and lands are hereby determined to be specially benefited by said work, and in an amount equal to the cost thereof.

Sec. 4. That said assessment so to be levied shall be paid in one installment in the manner provided in the case of assessments for public improvements.

Sec. 5. That to provide a fund out of which to pay the cost and expense of said work bonds or certificates of indebtedness are hereby authorized to be issued and sold, as needed, in the manner provided by law, in anticipation of the levy and collection of said assessments.

Sec. 6. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
