COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Regular Meeting, Oct. 4, 1920.

Council met in regular session with President J. C. Nailor in the chair and Clerk Moore present. Roll call showed six members of council present. Councilman Justus was absent.

The trustees of the sinking fund notified their refusal to accept the following bonds: Fire department, motor driven apparatus, \$85,000; street sprinkling and cleaning, \$75,000; sewer and drain repair, \$18,000; improvement alley west of Kellogg from Grove to the alley north of Grove, \$2000. Placed on file.

E. B. McFadden, secretary of the sinking fund school district notified council in a communication of the refusal of the trustees to accept the following bonds: Fire department motor driven apparatus, \$85,000; sewer and drainage, \$18,000; improvement alley west of Kellogg, \$2000. Notification of acceptance of street sprinkling and cleaning bonds to amount of \$75,000 was made. Placed on file.

W. M. Ginder, city auditor, submitted a statement of the condition of the tax levy funds as of July 1, 1920, and a financial statement of the city for the eight months ending August 31, 1920. Placed on file.

W. H. Duffy, service director, submitted a proposition from W. O. Watson suggesting the city purchase the coal rights on 1000 acres of land. Placed on file.

Edgar H. Gwynn and seventeen others protested against the operation of a veterinary hospital at 220 South Champion avenue. Placed on file.

Dell W. Ackerman and sixteen others presented a petition favoring daylight saving. Placed on file.

Evelyn Houck and nine others presented a petition asking for the improve-

ment of Midland avenue from Broad to Sullivan. Placed on file.

Theodore Leonard and four others submitted a protest against the proposed construction of a sewer in Rose avenue from Leonard to Snyder street. Placed on file.

The following ordinances were introduced and referred:

By Mr. Westlake, Ordinance No. 32,261, to appropriate property for the purpose of opening and extending Blackberry alley from Nursery Lane to Mitthoff street. Public Service.

By Mr. Westlake, Ordinance No. 32,255, to accept the plat of Caputo's Addition to the city of Columbus. Public Service.

Ordinance Lost

An Ordinance, No. 32,248, introduced by Mr. Weinland as an emergency measure, approving and authorizing the modification of River Channel Improvement Contract No. 3-A with the Callahan Construction Company and adjusting certain claims arising therefrom, was lost by a vote of 5 to 1, six votes being necessary to pass it as an emergency measure. Councilman Westlake voted in the negative.

ORDINANCES PASSED

AN ORDINANCE NO. 32,256—Prohibiting the manufacture, sale, furnishing, possession and giving away of intoxicating liquors and the keeping of any place where intoxicating liquors are manufactured, sold, furnished, possessed, or given away, for beverage purposes, and providing the penalty therefor.

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus: Section 1. That whoever in the city of Columbus Ohio, manufactures, sells, furnishes, possesses or gives away intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes, or keeps a place where intoxicating liquors are manufactured, sold, furnished, possessed, or given away for beverage purpose, shall be fined for the first offense not less than one hundred dollars and not more than three hundred dollars, and for a second offense not less than three hundred dollars nor more than five hundred dollars; provided, that it shall not be a violation hereof to possess or give away intoxicating liquors in one's bona fide private dwelling, unless such private dwelling is a place of public resort; and provided further, that nothing herein shall be construed as to prohibit anything permitted or authorized to be done by the constitution or laws of Ohio, or by the constitution or laws of the United States relative to the traffic in intoxicating liquors.

Sec. 2. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 32,257—To vacate the first alley east of Taylor avenue running south from Emerald avenue to the first alley south of Emerald avenue from that portion of the alley south of Emerald avenue from the east line of Taylor avenue to a point 150 feet east of Taylor avenue.

Whereas, On the 5th day of August, 1920, a petition signed by all owners of the property abutting upon certain alleys hereinafter fully described was presented to council consenting to and praying that said alleys be vacated; and

Whereas, Council upon hearing is satisfied that there is good cause for such vacation as prayed for and that it will not be detrimental to the general interests and ought to be made; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the first alley east of Taylor avenue lying between the south line of Emerald avenue and the north line of the first alley south of Emerald avenue, and that portion of the first alley south of Emerald avenue from the east line of Taylor avenue to a point 150 feet east of Taylor avenue be and the same are hereby vacated.

Sec. 2. That said city of Columbus hereby reserves the right to operate and maintain any and all sewers and water lines now existing on said alleys and to enter thereon for the purpose of operating, repairing and maintaining the same. The cost of any changes or alterations made necessary by reason of the construction of any building or structure in said alley shall be borne by the board of education or its successors.

Sec. 3. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 32,258—To vacate the first alley south of Deshler street running east from Bruck street to Rex alley.

Whereas, On the 5th day of August, 1920, a petition signed by all owners of the property abutting upon a portion of a certain alley hereinafter fully described, was presented to council consenting to and praying that said portion of said alley be vacated; and

Whereas, Council upon hearing is satisfied that there is good cause for such vacation as prayed for and that it will not be detrimental to the general interests and ought to be made; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the first alley south of Deshler street lying between the east line of Bruck street and the west line of Rex alley be and the same is hereby vacated.

Sec. 2. That said city of Columbus hereby reserves the right to operate and maintain any and all sewers and water lines now existing on said portion of said alley and to enter thereon for the purpose of operating, repairing and maintaining the same. The cost of any changes or alterations made necessary by reason of the construction of any building or structure in said alley shall be borne by the board of education or its successors.

Sec. 3. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
