AN ORDINANCE NO. 3287—To levy special assessment upon the lots and lands benefited by the improvement of St. Clair avenue, from Long street to Spring street.
Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the assessment of the cost and expense of improving St. Clair avenue, from Long street to Spring street, by grading, draining, paving the roadway full width with concrete and laying water services in the city of Columbus, Ohio, which was filed in the office of the city clerk and reported to council by the chief engineer on September 26, 1921, be and the same is hereby confirmed; and, that there be and hereby is levied and assessed upon the lots and lands described in said report, the several amounts as therein set forth. It is hereby determined and declared that each of said lots and lands is specially benefited by said improvement in an amount equal to said assessment.

Sec. 2. That the total assessment shall be payable at the office of the city treasurer of Columbus, Ohio, within thirty days from date of the publication of this ordinance with interest at the rate of 5½ per cent from the first day of March, 1922, or at the option of the owner in ten annual installments with interest at the rate of 5½ per cent per annum upon deferred payments at the office of the county treasurer after the same has been certified to the county auditor for collection in the manner provided by law. The said assessment, after being so certified, however, may be paid in full or any number of annual installments may be paid at any tax collection time, with interest on same to semi-annual interest day next ensuing.

Sec. 3. That the said assessment, and all portions thereof, when collected, shall be paid into the sinking fund, and shall be applied to the payment of the bonds issued for said improvement and the interest thereon as the same shall become due, and to no other purpose whatsoever.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 32847—To levy special assessment upon the lots and lands benefited by the improvement of Elmwood avenue, from Donaldson street to Livingston avenue.

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the assessment of the cost and expense of improving Elmwood avenue, from Donaldson street to Livingston avenue, by grading, draining, curbing, paving the roadway with Trinidad pitch lake asphalt with Trimble block cement filler gutters, and laying water service pipe in the city of Columbus, Ohio, which was filed in the office of the city clerk and reported to council by the chief engineer on September 12, 1921, be and the same is hereby confirmed; and, that there be and hereby is levied and assessed upon the lots and lands described in said report, the several amounts as therein set forth. It is hereby determined and declared that each of said lots and lands is specially benefited by said improvement and in amount equal to said assessment.

Sec. 2. AN ORDINANCE NO. 32848— Authorizing the purchase of two automobiles and the disposition of two unserviceable automobiles in the division of police.

Whereas, An emergency exists in the usual daily operation of the division of police wherein there are two old unserviceable Ford automobiles; and on account of the shortage of proper equipment it is necessary to purchase two new automobiles; therefore.

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the express approval of council is hereby given, and the board of purchase is hereby authorized to purchase for the division of police, two five-passenger Ford automobiles to replace two old unserviceable Ford touring cars bearing motor numbers 1,418 197 and 2,355,102.

Sec. 2. That the express approval of council is hereby given and the board of purchase is hereby authorized to sell or trade in as a part of the purchase price, on new Ford automobiles, the two old unserviceable automobiles referred to in section 1 of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. That the expense involved in the purchase of the two Ford automobiles authorized in section 1 hereof shall be paid from the 700, outlay for equipment fund in department 36 and that an expenditure not exceeding \$900 is hereby authorized.

Sec. 4. That on account of the shortage of the necessary equipment in the division of police, this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval by the mayor.

It is hereby determined and declared that each of said lots and lands is specially benefited by said improvement and in amount equal to said assessment.

Sec. 2. AN ORDINANCE NO. 32851—To vacate a nine-foot alley deeded to the city by Lewis Huffman and accepted July 7, 1892, being the first alley north of Conklin street (south of Poplar avenue) running east from Delaware avenue to the first alley east of Delaware avenue.

Sec. 2. That said city of Columbus hereby reserves the right to operate and maintain any and all sewers and water lines now existing on said alley and to enter thereon for the purpose of operating, repairing and maintaining the same.
