COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Regular Meeting Nov. 21, 1921.

Council met in regular session with President Nailor in the chair and Clerk Moore present. Rollcall showed all members in their places.

Walter S. Lewis, city auditor, offered a financial report of the city for the ten months ending October 31, 1921. Placed on file.

W. E. Ayers and Emma L. Cook presented a protest against the proposed improvement of the alley west of Linden from Newton to Mooberry. Placed on file.

A. D. Jundt presented a protest against the proposed improvement of the alley west of Forsythe from Fifth to Sixth. Placed on file.

E. W. Keil presented a protest against the proposed improvement of the alley west of Twentieth from the alley north of Broad to Long. Placed on file.

Ordinances Referred.

By Mr. Lamneck, Ordinance No. 32,990, making an appropriation for the purpose of carrying on the activities of the various city departments for the year 1922. Finance.

By Mr. Westlake, Ordinance No. 32,991, to provide an issue of bonds for the purchase of property for additional market house space. Finance.

A resolution by Mr. Millikin, declaring intention to appropriate property for additional market house space, was referred to the public service committee.

ORDINANCES PASSED

AN ORDINANCE NO. 32,729—To vacate Snider street from a point fifteen feet east of the west line of lot No. 12 in Snider Brothers addition to the city of Columbus, Ohio, to the east end of Snider street and also to vacate the second alley east of Taylor avenue in

said addition from Snider street to the first alley north of Snider street.

Whereas, A petition and consent signed by the J. E. McNally Lumber company, who is the owner of property bounding and abutting on Snider street east of a point fifteen feet east of the west line of lot No. 12 in Snider Brothers addition to the city of Columbus, Ohio, and on the second alley east of Taylor avenue from Snider street to the first alley north of Snider street, was duly presented to council praying and consenting that said street and alley as herein described be vacated, and

Whereas, Due notice of said petition and consent has been given as required by law, and

Whereas, Council upon hearing is satisfied that there is good cause for said vacation as prayed for, and that it will not be detrimental to the general interests and ought to be made; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That Snider street from a point fifteen feet east of the west line of lot 12 in Snider Brothers addition to the city of Columbus, Ohio, to the east end of Snider street, be and the same is hereby vacated and also the second alley east of Taylor avenue from Snider street to the first alley north of Snider street be and the same is hereby vacated.

Sec. 2. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 32,888—To provide for the issue of bonds to pay the cost and expense of acquiring by purchase or condemnation proceedings a certain tract of land approximately twenty acres in Clinton township for park and public playground purposes.

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That for the purpose of raising money to pay the cost and expense of acquiring by purchase or condemnation proceedings a certain tract of land consisting of approximately twenty acres in Clinton township owned by the heirs of Henry Kiner, bounded on the south by Briarwood avenue, on the north by the first alley south of Genesee avenue and being also the present boundary line of the city of Columbus, on the east by the present boundary line of the city of Columbus, and on the west by land owned by John Kiner, for park and playground purposes, it is hereby declared necessary to issue and there shall be issued bonds of said city in the amount of \$10,100.

Sec. 2. Said bonds shall be signed by the mayor and auditor, bear date not later than March 1, 1922, and be due and payable March 1, 1932. Nine of said bonds shall be of the denomination of \$1000 each and one of said bonds shall be of the denomination of \$1100. Said bonds shall be numbered from one to ten, both inclusive. They shall bear interest at the rate of five percent per annum, payable semi-annually on the first days of March and September of each year, and for which the proper interest coupons bearing a fac-simile of the signature of the auditor shall be attached to and made a part of said bonds. Principal and interest shall be payable at the office of the treasurer of the city of Columbus, Ohio.

Sec. 3. For the purpose of paying the interest on the bonds herein authorized and providing a sinking fund for their final redemption at maturity the trustees of the sinking fund of the city of Columbus, shall annually certify to the auditor of Franklin county

the amount necessary to pay the interest with a proportionate amount necessary to be levied in such year for sinking fund purposes, so that the interest on such bonds shall be paid as the same accrues, and a sinking fund provided for sufficient to discharge the principal of said bonds when the same become due, and that said county auditor shall compute and ascertain the rate of levy necessary to provide therefor in each year, and shall place the same upon the duplicate for the year for which it is certified and in addition to all other levies.

Sec. 4. The committee on finance of this council is hereby directed to have said bonds and coupons properly prepared and executed, to sell the same and to deposit the proceeds in the city treasury in a fund to be designated as the Linden park fund.

Sec. 5. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 32,950—To vacate a portion of a twenty-foot alley, being the first alley north of Broad street, running east from Brunson avenue one hundred and three feet.

Whereas, On the fourth day of November, 1921, a petition signed by all owners of the property abutting upon a portion of a certain twenty-foot alley, hereinafter fully described, was duly presented to council consenting to and praying that said portion of said alley be vacated;

Whereas, Council upon hearing is satisfied that there is good cause for such vacation as prayed for and that it will not be detrimental to the general interests and ought to be made; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That that part of a twenty-foot alley, being the first alley north of Broad street, lying between the east end of Brunson avenue and extending one hundred and three feet east of east line of the said Brunson avenue be and the same is hereby vacated.

Sec. 2. That said city of Columbus hereby reserves the right to operate and maintain any and all sewers and water lines now existing on said portion of said alley and to enter thereon for the purpose of operating, repairing and maintaining the same.

Sec. 3. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 32,982—Providing for the payment of the claim of H. R. Quigley and Mrs. H. R. Quigley for personal injuries.

Whereas, On September 8, 1921, certain fire apparatus of the city in passing State and High streets collided with a safety zone standard in such fashion that a piece thereof was broken off and struck Mrs. H. R. Quigley who was standing at said intersection, injuring and cutting her ankle, without fault on her part; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the claim of Mrs. H. R. Quigley, 536 West Third avenue, Columbus, Ohio, in the sum of \$51.15, the same being amount of damages resulting from personal
