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COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Regular meeting Monday Oct. 15, 1923

Council met in regular session with President Zimpher in the chair and City Clerk Turner present. Roll call showed all members of council present.

The C. C. C. & St. L. railway presented a petition for the vacating of Beaver alley, lot No. 3, in Lazell's north addition to Henrietta street; also Hamlet street, Goodale to Beaver. Placed on file.

The P-J Realty company submitted a communication in regard to the purchase of land between Broad and Sullivant for park purposes. Placed on file.

The Ohio Bell Telephone company and five others presented a petition for the vacating of alley south of Fifth avenue, between Pearl and Mt. Pleasant. Placed on file.

Ordinances Referred

By Mr. Millikin, No. 34,519, to make an additional appropriation to the Scioto river park, Town to Rich street, fund. Finance.

By Mr. Millikin, No. 34,521, to regulate parking of automobiles on the old city hall site. Public safety and health.

By Mr. Millikin, No. 34,522, to authorize purchase of 1½ square feet off northeast corner of lot at southwest corner of Starling and Walnut streets. Public service.

By the zoning plan adopted by Providence, R. I., the old colonial residence district, lying near to the business section, was restricted from business of all kinds, thus showing that sentiment can creep into the cold exigencies of city planning.

ORDINANCES PASSED

AN ORDINANCE NO. 34,494—To vacate a portion of the first alley east of Indianola avenue, from Eighteenth avenue to the first alley north of Eighteenth avenue.

Whereas, On the first day of October, 1923, a petition by the owners of all the lots abutting on the first alley east of Indianola avenue, from Eighteenth avenue to the first alley north of Eighteenth avenue, was duly presented to council praying and consenting that said portion of said alley be vacated, and,

Whereas, Council, upon hearing, is satisfied that there is good cause for said vacation as prayed for, that it will not be detrimental to the general interests, and ought to be made; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the first alley east of Indianola avenue, from Eighteenth avenue to a point 54 feet north of Eighteenth avenue, be and the same is hereby vacated.

Sec. 2. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 34,507—Authorizing the board of purchase to advertise for bids and enter into a contract for the purchase of one 1½ to 2 ton telephone line truck for the fire and police telegraph division and to trade in or sell one unserviceable model No. 120 service truck now in use in said division.

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the board of purchase be and it hereby is authorized to advertise for bids according to law and to enter into the necessary contract for the purchase of one 1½ to 2 ton telephone line truck for the fire and police telegraph division, advertising in the same advertisement for the sale and exchange by the city of one unserviceable model No. 120 service truck belonging to said division.

Sec. 2. That the approval of council is hereby given and the board of purchase is hereby authorized to sell or trade in as a part of the purchase price of 1½ to 2 ton telephone line truck, the unserviceable model No. 120 service truck belonging to said division.

Sec. 3. That there be and hereby is appropriated from the public safety fund Nos. 34 and 35-700 the sum of \$2600, or so much thereof as may be necessary for the payment of said contract, to be approved and vouchered as provided by the general appropriation ordinance.

Sec. 4. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 34,511—To provide for the issue of bonds in anticipation of the collection of special assessments for the improvements therein named.

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That for the purpose of raising money in anticipation of the collection of special assessments for the improvement of Buttles avenue, from Dennison avenue to Ingleside avenue, by grading, draining, curbing, re-surfacing the present roadway with asphalt, erecting street signs and laying necessary water services and sewer connections; Princeton avenue, from Broad street to P. C. C. & St. L. R. R., by re-surfacing the present roadway with asphalt; Rich street, from the second alley west of Loeffler avenue to Loeffler avenue; Southwood avenue, from the alley west of Eighth street to Parsons avenue; and Ohlen avenue, from Eleventh avenue to C. S. & H. Ry., by grading, draining, curbing, paving the roadway with asphalt, erecting street signs, laying water main, necessary water services and sewer connections; Clinton place, from High street to the second alley west of High street; Findley avenue (formerly Brenton street), from Tulane road to Tibet road; Allen avenue, from Bryden road to Main street; and Chittenden avenue, from Cleveland avenue to Gerald avenue, by grading, draining, curbing, paving the roadway with asphalt, erecting street signs and laying necessary water services and sewer connections; and Brunson avenue, from Broad street to Clifton avenue, by grading, draining, curbing, paving the roadway with asphalt and laying necessary water services and sewer connections, in accordance with ordinances Nos. 34,398, 34,373, 34,429, 34,427, 34,384, passed September 10, 1923; No. 34,366, passed August 6, 1923; Nos. 34,369, 34,389 and 34,423, passed September 10, 1923; and No. 33,432, passed July 10, 1922, respectively, bonds of said city shall be issued to the amount of one hundred eight thousand dollars.

Sec. 2. Said bonds shall be issued by the mayor and auditor, and not later than December 1, 1923, and shall be numbered and be due and payable as follows:

Said bonds shall be of the denomination of \$1,000 each, shall bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on the first days of March and September of each year and for which the proper interest coupons bearing a fac-simile of the signature of the auditor shall be attached to and made a part of said bonds. Principal and interest shall be payable at the office of the agency of the city of Columbus, Ohio, in New York City.

It is hereby stated and recited that the final tax settlement between the county treasurer and the city of Columbus next following the inclusion of a tax for the issue of the bonds herein provided for in the annual budget as provided by law, will take place in August, 1925.
