

annually during the period said bonds are to run, in an amount sufficient to provide funds to pay interest upon said bonds as and when the same falls due, and also to provide a fund for the discharge of the principal of said serial bonds at maturity, which tax shall not be less than the interest and sinking fund tax required by section 11 of article XII of the constitution.

Said tax shall be and is hereby ordered computed, certified, levied and extended upon the tax duplicate and collected by the same officers, in the same manner and at the same time that taxes for general purposes for each of said years are certified, extended and collected. Said tax shall be placed before and in preference to all other items, and for the full amount thereof. The funds derived from said tax levies hereby required, shall be placed in a separate and distinct fund, which, together with the interest collected on the same, shall be irrevocably pledged for the payment of principal and interest of said bonds when and as the same fall due.

Sec. 4. The city auditor is hereby authorized and directed to certify a copy of this ordinance to the auditor of Franklin county, Ohio, in accordance with the provisions of Section 5649-1b of the general code of Ohio.

Sec. 5. The committee on finance of this council is hereby directed to have said bonds and coupons properly prepared and executed, to sell the same and to deposit the proceeds in the city treasury in a fund to be designated as the Parsons avenue widening fund.

Sec. 6. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

- 4 50-amp., 220 V., poly phase, watt hour meters with metal covers.

Sec. 2. That the sum of \$3,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be and the same is hereby appropriated from department No. 82—710 fund to pay the cost of same.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 34,975—To authorize the purchase of the property therein described for a site for a fire or engine house for use of the division of fire of the city of Columbus, appropriating the money therefor and to repeal ordinance No. 34,962, passed February 11, 1924.

Whereas, The acquisition of the following described property is immediately necessary for the construction and erection of a fire or engine house thereon, and is therefore necessary for the immediate preservation of the public safety in order to provide additional fire protection for the city of Columbus and its inhabitants; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That in accordance with an option obtained by the city attorney, the director of public service be and he is hereby authorized and directed to purchase, in fee simple, the following described property for a site for a fire or engine house for use of the division of fire of the city of Columbus, to-wit:

Situated in the county of Franklin, state of Ohio, in the city of Columbus, and bounded and described as follows: Being lots Nos. 16 and 17 in Drexel park, an addition to the city of Columbus, Franklin county, Ohio, as the same are numbered and delineated upon the recorded plat thereof, of record in plat book 9, page 11, recorder's office, Franklin county, Ohio;

from Sarah A. Young, or any other person or persons having an interest therein, for the sum of \$3200, same to be free and clear from all incumbrances whatsoever except taxes and assessments due and payable after June, 1924.

Sec. 2. That from the moneys now in the general fund and from all moneys estimated to come into said fund from any and all sources during the

balance of the twelve months ending December 31, 1924, and not otherwise appropriated, there be and hereby is appropriated the sum of \$3350, or so much thereof as may be necessary, for the payment of the consideration of said property, which consideration shall be paid upon voucher signed by the director of public service after approval by the city attorney of the title and deed therefor; for the transferring and recording of said deed, which transferring and recording shall be paid on vouchers signed by the city clerk; and for the payment of any taxes and assessments which said city is to pay, which shall be paid on voucher signed by the city attorney. The said sum of \$3350, or so much thereof as may be used, is to be replaced in the general fund from the proceeds of the sale of bonds hereafter to be issued for the purpose of acquiring said site for such fire or engine house.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 34,977—To authorize the payment of the salary claims of William P. Donohoo and Hugh McMahon.

Whereas, William P. Donohoo, formerly superintendent of the workhouse, and Hugh McMahon, guard at said workhouse, were discharged by the director of public safety on May 11, 1922, and,

Whereas, On the 12th day of February, 1924, both of said discharges were found by the civil service commission to be invalid, and said orders to discharge were disaffirmed by said commission, and,

tendent of the workhouse was abolished, effective February 22, 1923, and,

Donohoo until the date when his said office was abolished amounted to \$1,498.66, and his earnings from the period of time he was removed from office to the time of abolishing his position amounted to \$1,023, leaving a balance due him from the city of \$475.43, and,

Whereas, The salary of Hugh McMahon from the time of his suspension to the time of his reinstatement amounted to \$2,334.33, from which should be deducted the amount of his earnings during said period in the sum of \$668, making the sum of \$2,067.65 due him from the city; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the claim of William P. Donohoo for salary in the amount of \$475.43, and the claim of Hugh McMahon for salary in the amount of \$2,067.65, be and the same are hereby recognized as moral obligations and legal claims against the city of Columbus and upon vouchers approved by the director of public safety, the city auditor is hereby authorized to draw his warrant and the city treasurer to pay said claims in said amounts respectively.

Sec. 2. That from the moneys in the fund known as the general fund, otherwise known as the fund for general purposes, and from all moneys estimated to come into said fund during the remainder of the twelve months ending December 31, 1924, from any and all sources, and not otherwise appropriated, there be and there hereby is appropriated the sum of \$2,543.08 for the purpose of paying the claims as set forth in section 1 hereof.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 34,978—Authorizing the board of purchase to advertise for bids and to enter into contract for the purchase of one truck for engineering crew and disposition of one unserviceable Ford automobile.

Whereas, The automobile with combination body now in use by the engineering crew in charge of sewer construction is in a worn-out and unserviceable condition, and,

Whereas, In view of the large amount of sewer construction now going on, it is necessary to furnish said engineering crew with transportation in order that they may give proper attention to all sewer construction contracts; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the board of purchase be and is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for bids and to enter into contract for the purchase of one new automobile with combination or suburban type body for use in the division of engineering and construction, same to be in accordance with specifications on file in the board of purchase.

That the board of purchase is hereby authorized to sell or trade in as a part of the purchase price, one unserviceable Ford automobile now in the division of engineering and construction, and to deposit the money derived from said sale, if sold for cash, to the credit of the engineering No. 61-700 fund.
