AN ORDINANCE No. 38681—To vacate Sixth avenue from the west line of Fourth street to the west line of Hamlet street, and to repeal ordinance No. 38376, passed August 1, 1927.

Whereas, On the 14th day of November, 1927, this council duly adopted a resolution declaring its intention to vacate Sixth avenue from the west line of Fourth street to the west line of Hamlet street, and notice of the adoption of said resolution has been given as required by law by publication in the City Bulletin for six consecutive weeks, ending December 31, 1927; and,

Whereas, Council, upon hearing, is satisfied that there is good cause for such vacation as provided for in said resolution, and that it will not be detrimental to the general interest, and ought to be made; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That Sixth avenue from the west line of Fourth street to the west line of Hamlet street, being a strip of ground 27 feet wide and 333.23 feet long situated in and being a part of lots 29 and 18 of John Hyer's amended subdivision, of record in plat book 1, page 383, Franklin county plat records, more fully described as follows:

Beginning at a point where the south line of lot 29 of said Hyer's subdivision intersects the west line of Fourth street; thence westwardly 333.23 feet, more or less, to a point where the west line of Hamlet street intersects the same; thence northerly with the west line of Hamlet street produced northerly, 27 feet; thence eastwardly and parallel to the south line of said lots 29 and 18, 333.23 feet, more or less, to the west line of Fourth street; thence southwardly with the west line of Fourth street, 27 feet to the place of beginning;

be and the same is hereby vacated.

Sec. 2. That the portion of said Sixth avenue so vacated herein shall revert to the city of Columbus and to the parcel of ground from which the same was taken by the dedication of that portion of said Sixth avenue, as provided in ordinance No. 38341, passed July 25, 1927, and shall be a part of what is known as Weinland Park.

Sec. 3. That ordinance No. 38376, passed August 1, 1927, be and the same is hereby repealed.

AN ORDINANCE No. 38685—To ratify and confirm action of the director of public service in contracting for a constant current regulator for High street lighting system between Goodale street and Fifth avenue.

Whereas, On the night of December 31, 1927, one of the constant regulators feeding the High street lighting system between Goodale street and Fifth avenue burned out, putting one circuit out of service; and,

Whereas, The director of public service got in immediate touch with the General Electric company which quoted a replacement price for a new regulator of \$711, with a credit of \$150 for the return of the burnt-out regulator, C. O. b. Lynn, Mass.; and,

Whereas, The burning out of said regulator created an emergency in the daily operation of the division of electricity, department of public service, which required immediate action and replacement in order that High street between Goodale street and Fifth avenue, might be properly lighted; and,

Whereas, The director of public service, under these facts and conditions, ordered for immediate shipment, 1—30 KVA, subway type, C. C. regulator, 2300 volts primary, 6.6 sec. amp. 60 cycle, to replace regulator No. 3749161 burnt out at Second avenue and High street, at the price hereinbefore stated; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the action of the director of public service in ordering for immediate shipment from the General Electric company one constant current regulator as set forth in the preamble hereto, and at the price stated therein, be and the same is hereby ratified and confirmed.

Sec. 2. That the sum of \$561 be and the same is hereby appropriated from department No. 82, 300 fund, in 1928 appropriation in order to pay for the same.

Sec. 3. That for the reasons stated in the preamble hereto this ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval by the mayor.

AN ORDINANCE No. 38686—To provide for the issue of bonds to pay the cost and expense of repairing the North High street viaduct.

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That for the purpose of raising money to pay the cost and expense of repairing the North High street viaduct, it is hereby declared necessary to issue and there shall be issued bonds of the city of Columbus, Ohio, in the amount of \$20,000.

Sec. 2. Said bonds shall be signed by the mayor and auditor, bear date not later than February 15, 1928, and shall be numbered and be due and payable as follows:

Said bonds shall be of the denomination of one thousand dollars each, shall bear interest at the rate of four and one-half per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on the first days of January and July of each year, and for which the proper interest coupons bearing a fac-simile of the signature of the auditor shall be attached to and made a part of said bonds. Principal and interest shall be payable at the office of the agency of the city of Columbus in the city of New York.

It is hereby stated and recited that the final tax settlement between the county treasurer and the city of Columbus, next following the inclusion of a tax for the issue of the bonds herein provided for in the annual budget, as provided by law, will take place in August, 1929.

Sec. 3. For the purpose of providing the necessary funds to pay the interest on the foregoing issue of bonds, promptly when and as the same falls due, and also to provide a fund sufficient to discharge the said serial bonds at maturity, there shall be and is hereby levied on all taxable property in the city of Columbus, in addition to all other taxes, a direct tax annually during the period said bonds are to run, in an amount sufficient to provide funds to pay the interest upon said bonds, as and when the same shall fall due, and also to provide a fund for the discharge of the principal of said serial bonds at maturity, which tax shall not be less than the interest and sinking fund tax required by section 11 of article XII of the constitution.

Said tax shall be and is hereby ordered computed, certified, levied and extended upon the tax duplicate and collected by the same officers, in the same manner and at the same time that taxes for general purposes for each of said years are certified, extended and collected. Said tax shall be placed before and in preference to all other items and for the full amount thereof. The funds derived from said tax levies hereby required, shall be placed in a separate and distinct fund, which together with the interest collected on the same, shall be irrevocably pledged for the payment of principal and interest of said bonds, when and as the same fall due.

Sec. 4. The city auditor is hereby authorized and directed to certify a copy of this ordinance to the auditor of Franklin county, Ohio, in accordance with the provisions of section 5649-1b of the general code of Ohio.

Sec. 5. The committee on finance of this council is hereby directed to have said bonds and coupons properly prepared and executed to sell the same and to deposit the proceeds in the city treasury in a fund to be designated as North High street repair fund No. 2. Provided, however, that the sum of \$1000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, from the proceeds of the sale of said bonds be and the same is hereby appropriated for the payment of one year's interest on the bonds herein authorized.

Sec. 6. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
