Sec. 3. That the sum of \$2000, or as much thereof as may be necessary, be and the same is hereby appropriated from the division of water 90 fund, to pay the cost and expense of the same.

AN ORDINANCE No. 39471—To authorize the purchase of an easement in the property herein described for drainage purposes and appropriating the money therefor.

Whereas, an emergency exists in the usual daily operation of the department of public service, division of engineering and construction, in that it is immediately necessary to acquire an easement in certain property for the construction of a 60-inch and 66-inch storm drain so that adequate drainage may be maintained in the northeast portion of the city; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That in accordance with an option obtained by the city attorney, the director of public service be and he is hereby authorized and directed to purchase an easement, giving the right to construct and perpetually maintain a storm drain with the right to clean, repair and care for the same and with the right of access for said purposes through and to the following described property, to-wit:

Situated in the county of Franklin, state of Ohio, city of Columbus, and being a strip of land 15 feet in width across a tract of land owned by M. P. Innis, as recorded in deed book 315, page 395, Franklin county recorder's office, the center line of which strip is described as follows:

Beginning at a point which is the intersection of the center line of Twenty-fourth avenue and the west line of Linmoor addition; thence westerly on a line coincident with the center line of Twenty-fourth avenue extended 1237.2 feet to a point; thence westerly on a line 1° 51' to the right 99 feet more or less to a point in the west boundary of the aforesaid Innis tract, with the right during the construction of said drain to use, for the purpose of excavating the trench therefor and storing the dirt therefrom, a strip 25 feet wide on either side of the above described center line;

from M. P. Innis, or any other person or persons having an interest therein, for the sum of \$300; it being under-

stood and agreed that the city of Columbus, in the construction of said storm drain, is to replace the top soil on the top of the ground so as not to injure the soil for agricultural purposes.

Sec. 2. That the sum of \$300 be and the same is hereby appropriated from storm drain funds No. 3, contract No. 5, Northwood avenue, 132 feet east of Maco avenue to alley east of Velma avenue, etc., for the payment of the purchase price of said easement, which shall be paid on voucher signed by the director of public service after approval by the city attorney of the deed therefor.

Sec. 3. That for the reasons stated in the preamble hereto this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval by the mayor.

AN ORDINANCE No. 39476—To provide for the issuance and sale of bonds for the purpose of raising funds to pay the cost and expense of acquiring by purchase or condemnation proceedings land necessary for a landing field, either within or without the limits of the municipality, for aircraft and transportation terminals and uses associated therewith or incident thereto, and the right of way for connections with highways, electric, steam or interurban railroads, and to improve and equip the same with structures necessary or appropriate for such purposes, in the sum of \$850,000, and providing for the levy of a tax outside the fifteen mill limitation prescribed by law to pay the interest on and retire said bonds.

Whereas, at the general election held in the city of Columbus, Ohio, on the 6th day of November, 1928, the question of issuing and selling bonds of said city in the sum of \$850,000, for the purpose hereinafter mentioned, was duly submitted to the qualified electors of the city of Columbus in pursuance of resolutions duly adopted by the council of said city on the 5th day of September, 1928 and the 10th day of September, 1928, respectively; and,

Whereas, more than fifty-five per cent of the electors voting at such election upon the question of issuing such bonds voted in favor thereof; and,

Whereas, an emergency exists in the usual daily operation of the department of public lands and buildings in that it is immediately necessary to acquire and equip said landing field in order that existing opportunities for its profitable use may not be lost; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That for the purpose of raising funds to pay the cost and expense of acquiring by purchase or condemnation proceedings land necessary for a landing field, either within or without the limits of the municipality, for aircraft and transportation terminals and uses associated therewith or incident thereto, and the right of way for connections with highways, electric, steam or interurban railroads, and to improve and equip the same with structures necessary or appropriate for such purposes, it is hereby declared necessary to issue and there shall be issued bonds of the city of Columbus, Ohio, in the sum of \$850,000, and that notes shall not be issued in anticipation thereof.

Sec. 2. Said bonds shall be signed by the mayor and auditor, bear date not later than January 1, 1929, and shall be numbered and be due and payable as follows:

Said bonds shall be of the denomination of \$1000 each, shall bear interest at the rate of four and one-half per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on the first days of January and July of each year and for which the proper
