## COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

### Regular Meeting, Monday, Feb. 25, 1929

Council met in regular session with President Wehe in the chair. Roll call showed all members of council present.

Mayor Thomas returned ordinance No. 72-29, providing for the annexation of territory west of Greenlawn cemetery, disapproved. Laid over until council may act.

Mayor Thomas submitted the following names for reappointment as members of the board of plumbing examiners: Goodwin L. Bebb, William F. Blair and Joseph W. Schneider, and the following names for reappointment as members of the Franklin park commission: William O. Holmes and Paul Eisele. Appointments confirmed and communication placed on file.

Also a copy of a resolution adopted by the city commission of the city of Middletown, Ohio, protesting against proposed legislation by the general assembly to reduce the percentage of the gasoline tax to be paid municipalities. Placed on file.

Annual reports for 1928 were submitted by the divisions of street cleaning and refuse collection. Placed on file.

Chief Engineer R. H. Simpson reported the estimated assessment for certain proposed improvements: Gates street, west line of lots 9 and 18 of Essex subdivision to the alley east of Gilbert street, etc. Placed on file.

A Ryan avenue resident submitted a request for the construction of sidewalks on that street. Service.

The Southwest Advancement league submitted a communication in regard to the condition of the river channel south of Mound street. Service.

L. G. Dolder submitted a communication urging the need for a fire sta-

tion in the vicinity of Hague and Sullivant avenues. Safety.

The Columbus Railway, Power & Light company submitted notification of its intention to increase car fares effective March 1, 1929. Utilities.

The Hamilton Milk company submitted a communication expressing appreciation for the loan of fifteen horses. Placed on file.

The Columbus Railway, Power & Light company presented a claim for \$68.93 for replacement of a pole broken by a city garbage truck. Judiciary.

Wm. A. Hart presented a protest against school teachers parking their machines in front of his residence at 873 East Eleventh avenue. Safety.

## ORDINANCES PASSED

**AN ORDINANCE No. 48-29**—To accept the deeds of Henry W. Geshwilm and Catherine W. Geshwilm, his wife, dated December 7, 1927, Richard Hughes and Caroline Hughes, his wife, dated December 8, 1927, William Anderson, unmarried, dated December 9, 1927 and married, dated December 9, 1927 and Charlotte M. Bartow and Charles H. Bartow, her husband, dated December 10, 1927, and to dedicate the premises therein conveyed to public use for street purposes for the opening and extending of Whittier street.

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That the deed of Henry W. Geshwilm and Catherine W. Geshwilm, his wife, dated December 7, 1927, for lots 98 and 99 of Lennox addition to the city of Columbus, as the same are numbered and delineated upon the recorded plat thereof, of record in plat book 7, page 282, recorder's office, Franklin county, Ohio; the deed of Richard Hughes and Caroline Hughes, his wife, dated December 8, 1927, for lot 64 said Lennox addition; the deed of William Anderson, unmarried, dated December 9, 1927, for lots 204 and 205 said Lennox addition; and the deed of Charlotte M. Bartow and Charles H. Bartow, her husband, dated December 10, 1927, for lot 65 of said Lennox addition, be and the same are hereby ac-

cepted and the premises so conveyed are hereby dedicated to public use for street purposes for the opening and extending of Whittier street.

Sec. 2. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

**AN ORDINANCE No. 140-29**—To provide for the issue of bonds in anticipation of the collection of special assessments for the improvement herein named.

Be it ordained by the council of the city of Columbus:

Section 1. That for the purpose of raising money in anticipation of the collection of special assessments for the improvement of Northwest boulevard from Third avenue to Fifth avenue by providing for the lighting thereof, by erecting lighting standards and lighting fixtures and underground cable therefor, in accordance with ordinance No. 38443, passed September 19, 1927, bonds of said city shall be issued to the amount of \$2400 to pay notes previously issued and about to mature.

Sec. 2. Said bonds shall be signed by the mayor and auditor, bear date not later than April 1, 1929, and shall be numbered and be due and payable as follows:

Bond numbered 1 shall be of the denomination of \$400, and bonds numbered 2 to 5, inclusive, shall be of the denomination of \$500 each, shall bear interest at the rate of four and one-half per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on the first days of March and September of each year and for which the proper interest coupons bearing a fac-simile of the signature of the auditor shall be attached to and made a part of said bonds. Principal and interest shall be payable at the office of the agency of the city of Columbus, Ohio, in the city of New York.

It is hereby stated and recited that the final tax settlement between the county treasurer and the city of Columbus, next following the inclusion of a tax for the issue of the bonds herein provided for in the annual budget, as provided by law, will take place in August, 1930.

Sec. 3. For the purpose of providing the necessary funds to pay the interest on the foregoing issue of bonds promptly, when and as the same falls due, and also to provide a fund sufficient to discharge the said serial bonds at maturity, there shall be and is hereby levied on all taxable property in the city of Columbus, in addition to all other taxes, a direct tax annually during the period said bonds are to run, in an amount sufficient to provide funds to pay the interest upon said bonds as and when the same shall fall due, and also to provide a fund for the discharge of the principal of said serial bonds at maturity, which tax shall not be less than the interest and sinking fund tax required by section 11 of article XII of the constitution. Provided, however, that in each year that the assessments anticipated by said bonds are
